DAVID HAYES was born in Hartford. Connecticut and received an A.B. degree from the University of Notre Dame in 1953 and a M.F.A. degree from Indiana University in 1955, where he studied with David Smith. He has received a postdoctoral Fulbright award, a Guggenheim Fellowship, and a grant from the National Institute of Arts and Letters. He has been appointed Visiting Artist at the Carpenter Art Center, Harvard University, and has represented the United States at the Forma Viva sculpture symposium in Portoroz, Jugoslavia. He served on the National Screening Committee for the Fulbright-Hays awards in sculpture and was the subject of documentary films in 1991 and 1998 on Connecticut Public Television. He has had over 300 exhibitions and is included in over 100 major museums and collections, including that of the Museum of Modern Art in New York. He resides in Coventry, Connecticut.

The Burt Reynolds and Friends Museum is a not-for-profit organization which contains an extensive collection of gifts, memorabilia and autographed pictures from Hollywood's most famous stars, world leaders, and the world's greatest athletes.

A special area in the museum features Burt's prized collection of western memorabilia given to him by legendary cowboys such as Roy Rogers and Gene Autry.

The museum mission is to celebrate the cultural contributions and historical impact Burt Reynolds has had in the film industry and our hometown. The museum will reestablish the theater and film educational programs originally conceived by Burt.

Burt Reynolds, an international celebrity for over forty years, has made Jupiter his home for most of his career. It is appropriate that our community would establish a museum in Jupiter to highlight his lifetime achievements.

Burt Reynolds brought the magic of Hollywood back home and helped develop Jupiter's cultural identity. According to Burt, "The beauty of the museum is a result of the generosity of the community."
